The focus is on humanitarian ideas and practices in the new world (dis)order, although with a clear attention to their historical roots and trajectories. As a consequence, criminology of humanitarianism offers a new perspective on crime, control and social harm in humanitarian contexts that is postcolonial in theory and practice.</p>
